Living Well with Hepatitis B CONVERSATION PROMPTS



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Notes for teachers/educators

This activity encourages and assists participants with learning how to ask and respond to questions relating to health and hepatitis B.

Instructions:

- 1. Organise participants into pairs or groups. Hand out either the green or purple prompt cards to groups depending on their English level.
- 2. One participant will read a question from the prompt cards.
- 3. One (or more) person(s) will read the answer from the reverse side of the prompt card.
- 4. Provide opportunities for participants to read other prompt cards.

Cards are colour coded according to difficulty

- Green → Beginner to low intermediate English level.
- Purple → High intermediate to advance English level.

Tips:

- \rightarrow Encourage participants to practice saying their questions or answers slowly.
- → Help participants formulate their own questions and answers.
- → Encourage participants to answer questions without looking at the answer.

- 1. What does a vaccination do?
- 2. Have you been vaccinated before?
- 3. What was it for?
- 4. Are you scared of needles?

ANSWER

- 1. A vaccination keeps you healthy and safe from viruses and sicknesses/illnesses.
- 2. Yes, I have been vaccinated before / No, I haven't been vaccinated before.
- 3. I have been vaccinated for ...
- 4. Yes / No ...



- 1. What is a hepatitis B vaccination?
- 2. Why should you get vaccinated?
- 3. Where can you get vaccinated?
- 4. At what age can you get vaccinated?

ANSWER

Vaccination

- 1. A hepatitis B vaccination protects you from getting hepatitis B.
- 2. You should get vaccinated to protect your friends and family.
- 3. You can get vaccinated by your doctor at the clinic.
- 4. Babies and children need 4 hepatitis B vaccinations. Adults need 3 hepatitis B vaccinations. You can only get vaccinated for hepatitis B if you do not have hepatitis B.

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- 1. Who gives the vaccination?
- 2. How many hepatitis B vaccinations do I need?

Vaccination

- 1. A doctor can give the vaccination.
- 2. Adults need 3 vaccinations.

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Testing

- 1. What is a hepatitis B blood test?
- 2. Who does the hepatitis B blood test?

Testing

ANSWER

- 1. A hepatitis B blood test sees if you have hepatitis B or not. It can also let you know if you need to be vaccinated.
- 2. A doctor will do the hepatitis B blood test.





Testing

- 1. Where can you get tested for hepatitis B?
- 2. Why should you get tested for hepatitis B?
- 3. Should your family get tested?

ANSWER

Testing

- 1. You can get tested for hepatitis B by the doctor at the clinic.
- 2. You should get tested to know if you have hepatitis B or not, and if you need to be vaccinated or if you need treatment.
- 3. Yes, your family should get tested.





- 1. What does the hepatitis B treatment do?
- 2. What does the hepatitis B treatment look like?

- 1. The hepatitis B treatment helps people living with hepatitis B live a healthy life and lowers the risk of liver cancer.
- 2. The hepatitis B treatment is a pill or tablet that you take daily.





- 1. Where can you get the treatment?
- 2. Does everyone need to go on treatment if they have hepatitis B?
- 3. If you live with hepatitis B, when should I get a checkup?

ANSWER

- 1. You can only get treatment from your doctor.

 Your doctor will prescribe your hepatitis B medication.
- Not everyone needs to go on treatment. Your doctor will decide when you need to go on treatment.
- If you live with hepatitis B, you need to get a checkup every 6 months.





Transmission

- 1. What are some ways you can get hepatitis B?
- 2. What are some ways you cannot get hepatitis B?

ANSWER

Transmission

- 1. You can get hepatitis B through blood-to-blood contact, from your mother at birth if your mother has hepatitis B, and through unprotected sex when you are not vaccinated.
- 2. You cannot get hepatitis B through sharing food and drink, touching or hugging, coughing or sneezing, or through kissing. You cannot get hepatitis B through breastmilk, mosquitoes and holding hands.

1. Why do people believe in myths about how people get hepatitis B?

Transmission

 There are people who do not know what hepatitis B is, or they do not know much about hepatitis B.

- Yes, my family knows about hepatitis B /

- 1. Yes / No.
- 2. I went to the doctor ... (last year, last month).

- 2. Have you spoken to your doctor about hepatitis B?
- 3. Will you speak to your doctor about hepatitis B?

- 1. I speak ... (language) with my doctor.

Stigma and discrimination

- 1. Why do some people feel ashamed living with hepatitis B?
- 2. What are some ways people get treated unfairly for living with hepatitis B?
- 3. What can you do to stop people living with hepatitis B from being treated unfairly?

ANSWER

Stigma and discrimination

- 1. Some people believe that people live with hepatitis B because of their lifestyle and choices.
- People who live with hepatitis B may not get jobs or go to school, or get treated differently by family and friends.
 They can also get treated differently by doctors and nurses.
- Education, and letting people know about hepatitis B.
 Tell people there is a vaccination and treatment to help people stay healthy.

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Liver

- 1. How does the liver keep you healthy?
- 2. Have you talked about your liver health with your doctor?
- 3. What can hepatitis B do to the liver?

ANSWER

Liver

- 1. A healthy liver cleans your blood, makes and stores vitamins, and helps give you energy and balances your hormones.
- 2. Yes / No.
- 3. Hepatitis B can damage the liver and cause liver cancer.



Cooking at the school

- 1. Why was Chen sad?
- 2. How does Ling know about hepatitis B?

ANSWER

Cooking at the school

- 1. Chen thought she can't help with the cooking.
- 2. Ling has hepatitis B and visits her doctor.
- 3. Ling says many people from their country have hepatitis B and can keep their liver healthy.
- 4. Ling keeps her liver healthy by going to the doctor every six months, eating healthy food and getting regular exercise.

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Cooking at the school

- 1. What do you think Ling was cooking?
- 2. What do you like to cook?
- 3. Why did Chen think she cannot help with the cooking?
- 4. Why can Chen help with the cooking?

ANSWER

Cooking at the school

- 1. I think Ling was cooking ...
- 2. I like to cook ...
- 3. Chen has hepatitis B, and she thought she will 'give' it to others.
- 4. You can't get hepatitis B from sharing food and drink.

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Ayanda is pregnant

- 1. How do you stop a baby from getting hepatitis B?
- 2. Why did Ayanda go to an antenatal class?
- 3. What did the nurse talk about with Ayanda?
- 4. If you have hepatitis B, why do you need to see the doctor even if you don't feel sick?

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ANSWER

Ayanda is pregnant

- A baby needs two vaccinations at birth if the mother has hepatitis B.
 The baby will need to get three more hepatitis B vaccinations.
- Ayanda is learning about hepatitis B and how to take care of the baby.
- 3. The nurse talked about testing, vaccination and treatment for hepatitis B.
- 4. Most people don't show symptoms for hepatitis B.

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- 1. Are An and Linh married?
- 2. Are you married?
- 3. What does shocked mean? Why is Linh shocked?

- 1. No, they are not married yet. They are going to get married.
- 2. Yes, I am married / No, I am not married.
- 3. Shocked means surprised. Linh is shocked because she didn't know An has hepatitis B.



- 1. What kind of appointment did Linh make with her doctor?
- 2. Is it hard for you to book or make an appointment with a doctor? Why?

- 1. Linh is making an appointment to get her hepatitis B vaccination.
- 2. Yes, it is hard for me / No, it isn't hard for me.



- 1. What sport does Karim play?
- 2. Do you play sport? What sports do you like?
 What was the 'bad news' that Coach Joe has?

- 1. Karim plays soccer.
- 2. Yes, I like to play sports / No, I don't like to play sports. I like to play ...
- 3. Abraham is very sick in hospital and is dying.



- 1. Why is Abraham in the hospital?
- 2. Have you been to the hospital? Why?
- 3. Why is Karim and his team visiting Abraham?
- 4. How would you feel if your family is in hospital?

ANSWER

- 1. Abraham is in hospital because he has liver cancer and is dying. Hepatitis B can cause liver cancer.
- 2. Yes, I have been to the hospital / No, I haven't been to the hospital.
- 3. Karim and his team worry and care about Abraham.
